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


hard work they showed us some fancy computer generated maps that told us pretty much the same thing. Now that they have consulted with us, they are going to go away and look at what they need to do about it, and then who is responsible for doing it and where the funding comes from. About time too! In 2012, the Humber overflowed its banks and then only a few years after the last 100 year flood, parts of the village and surrounding farm land were suffering again. Thankfully not guite as bad as last time, perhaps the lock gates onto the Humber were

The Parish Council are asking for details of all flooding issues and photographs, if possible, so they can develop a plan of the full impact on the village this time.

This is a major problem, not just locally, and the solution is going to be very expensive and no doubt take forever. We are in the hands of the experts.

Some problems are more within our ability to solve. They may seem much less important than your home or land being threatened by flooding, but some parts of the way of life in our village are at stake.

The WI (Women's Institute) has been a stalwart of the village for years, old photographs show them packing out the Memorial Hall. Their numbers may be sadly reduced but they still do an amazing job of organising, as well as providing tea and fantastic cakes, for major village events, at a packed Memorial Hall, even now. They have an interesting programme of events and some fascinating speakers. They even invited me once and I had a few offers for page 3 girls. So they know how to have fun too. See their article on page 25 and their entry on the Noticeboard page 7 to see what amazing things they do. They would welcome new members and helpers.

The saddest day of the year is the day we have to take the decorations down – and I start looking forward to them going back up the day after that!

LETTER FROM THE CHAPEL

HOW BIG WILL YOUR CHRISTMAS TREE BE THIS YEAR?

Leaving aside the discussion about pine needles dropping everywhere and finding them at Easter or how artificial trees are so realistic or how we miss the wonderful smell of pine or the special family ritual of 'dressing' the tree with precious baubles collected year on year - leaving all that aside - how big will your tree be this year?

There are Christmas Tree Festivals at Barton and Barrow and both churches will be filled with lovely, imaginative, clever decorations on many trees: like in our homes, some residents will have traditional green and red; some will be silver or gold or even turquoise and purple! Some trees will be quirky or modest, creative or stunning.

But none of these trees will match the amazing construction over 40 feet tall and 20 feet wide in Bethlehem Manger Square in front of the Church of the Nativity, said to be where God became wrapped in human flesh and joined us on earth and changed us all for good!

How many go to the Bethlehem Square to watch the lights being switched on? Over 100,000 pack the town and try to squeeze in, keen to be near the large stage, hear the huge bagpipe bands of marching scouts, and watch the lights blazing above the tree which say 'Justice and Hope for Bethlehem'

Nothing could be more profound or stirring than that, especially as the people there will be Muslim, Jewish and Christian and live under constant threat from soldiers with guns and the extremism of desperate forces.

That may not be our experience but some folk here have had a wretched year of illness, continuing pain and hospital treatment, life-limiting and miserable but have borne it with immense courage and fortitude; some have had a year of disastrous relationships and hurt friendships; some have lost their dearest friend and feel adrift and alone and don't know how to survive Christmas. Well, for them and for you, those lights will blaze out for Hope for you and those you love and for people everywhere - a strong hope for justice and to live in freedom away from the gun and violence, as well as ill health.

However small your tree, fancy red bows or blue and silver lights, LED candles on every branch or treasured family baubles - may there be hope for all God's people - Christians, Jews and Muslims - and love to make your heart glad.

My prayer for you? That you will know God's joy this Christmas and Hope for a new year,

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

The total raised for our Schools to date is a staggering £7,833.60 in under 3 years


Every penny is spent for the benefit of the children at our 3 schools, providing equipment that their budget won't stretch to because of Government under funding.





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GOXHILL PRIMARY SCHOOL REPORT

We are very proud at Goxhill Primary School of the opportunities that we offer to our children. Education is about providing our children with experiences, skills and opportunities that will help them to develop as individuals and prepare them for life beyond the classroom and the education system.

We take pride in all that we do to offer our children a broad and rich curriculum that allows us to bring out their individual characters and personalities, selfconfidence, self-esteem, independence and respect for others and the community/world in which they live.

Forest School

Forest school provision enables children from across the school to access vital skills linked to problem solving, team building, patience and perseverance. Lots of children that are reluctant communicators or are shy, have been noted to come out of themselves during forest school sessions that provide the opportunity for the children to engage/communicate in a more relaxed environment. Almost all of KS2 have now experienced forest school sessions so we will



shortly be opening up these sessions up to children in KS1. Our aim is to ensure that every child participates in forest school sessions throughout their time at our school: many children will have the opportunity to complete additional cycles. We currently have three qualified forest school Leaders on site: Miss Marshall, Mrs Scott and Mr Fox. Forest school sessions enable us to nurture our

children and develop them as all-round individuals; we value personal/emotional growth as highly as we value academic growth and are proud of the opportunities that we offer to our children.

Outdoor Play and Learning (OPAL)

Outdoor Play and Learning (OPAL) is a unique approach to play and learning that we are embedding throughout our federation. It gives our children the opportunity to be 'children' and play creatively, problem solve and risk asses within a controlled and secure environment. The children explore their surroundings in all weathers (including rain and snow). Last year, we invested time and money into creating a more stimulating outdoor area for the children across the whole school that included a 50m squared section of the field encompassing sand and hills – the children have been very creative in the way that they use this space and already, in such a short space of time, they have gained a great deal of enjoyment from it. Learning and playing with children from other year groups across the school encourages the use of communication; as the children share and draw on their own 'real life' experiences, speaking and listening skills are developed and enhanced.

More recently, money has been invested from the 'sports premium' fund into buying table tennis tables/equipment and new football goals. As well as encouraging the children to stay active, this equipment encourages social interaction and helps to develop co-ordination and fine and gross motor skills.

Additional Enrichment

This year we have broadened the range of after school clubs available to our children.

We recently had Mr James Welsh come into school to deliver some free workshops to the children. James Welsh has a 3rd degree black belt in both Taekwondo and Karate and has over 35 years' experience in



coaching martial arts. Mr Walsh is part of the Taekwondo Association of Great Britain (TAGB) which is Europe's largest with over 35,000 members training in the UK at over 700 schools. He is also a founding member of the British Taekwondo Council: the only governing body recognised by Sport England. Due to the popularity of these workshops and the enjoyment that the children displayed whilst doing them, we are now running a taekwondo club once a week for beginners.

A new KS1 multi-skills sports club has been operating to encourage children to stay active but also to develop the co-ordination, teamwork and social skills of these children.

We run a weekly cookery club that is inclusive of all children wishing to participate. We also offer guitar lessons weekly through a musical specialist.

We run an imagination library 'book club' weekly that explores themes and ideas within books but also helps to develop a love of reading: the children explore/share stories in a practical way through drama, role play and arts and crafts.



We have recently become part of a network with Baysgarth School. This enables us to provide a wider range of sporting opportunities for our children. Once per month, a team of boys and girls is selected to play against other teams from local primary schools at Baysgarth School. The

teams change each time to ensure that every child that attends training is able to be part of the squad. This enables a wide range of our children to participate in competitive sport, developing self-confidence and self-esteem in addition to social skills

and agility/fitness levels.

On Friday 22nd November, 2019, we shall be taking the whole of KS2 to Baysgarth School to participate in cross country. Again this is another opportunity that the partnership with Baysgarth School offers to both us and our pupils.

Emotional Support

We are proud of the emotional support that we offer to our children. In addition to the enrichment provided through forest school, OPAL opportunities and out of school clubs, we have an on-site learning mentor and emotional well-being officer. We all work together to ensure that our pupils are developed as individuals; we provide a personalised education experience that helps to equip our children with vital life skills required for future personal growth and success.

New Sports Kit

We have managed to get a new football / sports kit for all three schools sponsored entirely by Wren Kitchens. This has saved us over £1200. We wanted to have a 'uniformed look' whilst maintaining the school's own logos to keep their identities.

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Summary of local sightings by Steve Routledge

August began in earnest on the 1st, with the best sightings around the East Halton area and included a local patch first in the form of a Green Woodpecker at Winter's Pond.

Also seen were 2 Wood Sandpiper and 11 of each of both Common Sandpiper & Little Egret at the Skitter. Non bird sightings on today's visit included a Harbour Porpoise and Grey Seal on the Humber.

On the 3rd, East Halton remained the focus area for the best sighting's with 2 Mediterranean Gulls being seen, a lovely marked juvenile and a rather scruffier 1st summer bird, the 2 Wood Sandpiper's were still present and

A nice surprise at Dawson City near Goxhill Haven was a lovely Red Kite watched thermalling before crossing over the Humber into Yorkshire.

After a week away in North Wales, it was back to more local patching, with a lovely juvenile Little Gull watched flying towards Killingholme in a big movement of Blackheaded Gulls along the Estuary and on the inland fields, the lovely sight of 8 juvenile Whinchat certainly brightened the day.

Two nice waders, both passage migrants from Scandinavia, made it into the notebook today, the first, an adult Curlew Sandpiper was seen on the large sandbank off Dawson City near Goxhill Haven and the second was a juvenile Spotted Redshank at East Halton Skitter, both very welcome sightings.

The final day of the month saw the Spotted Redshank still being seen around at the Skitter along with a good count of 650 Black-tailed Godwit, with the final highlight being 3 juvenile Little-ringed Plover at Winter's Pond at East

The months sightings started on the 8th with 6 Sanderling being recorded on the large sandbank off Dawson City nature reserve, where last months Curlew Sandpiper had been seen, this was followed by the lovely sight of 9 Bearded Tit, a species which has bred in Goxhill Haven the area this year. These 9 birds were seen in a small reed bed along the edge of the saltmarsh near Dawson City and provided a few photo opportunities.

Also recorded today were singles of Whinchat and Stonechat on the mitigation site at East Halton.

On the 15th the very rare sight of a Willow Tit along the borrow pits near Dawson City was only the second record of the year of this sadly declining species. It is thought that Blue Tits are out competing this species for nest sites and thus taking over the species breeding areas.

Also seen today were 3 Ruff and a pair of Bearded Tits between Dawson City and East Halton Skitter and 1104 Black-tailed Godwit feeding at the Skitter.

The 21st, saw the fantastic sight of 3 juvenile Hobby feeding over Langmere Wood between Goxhill and East Halton, the first I have encountered this year and could be locally bred birds. They were watched hawking Dragonflies, no doubt fuelling up for their long journeys to Africa for the winter.

At the Skitter an interesting



record of a Black-tailed Godwit with colour rings was seen and I received details back from the ringing scheme which had added the rings and the bird had been caught in Iceland on the 10th July 2012 and had subsequently been seen in Northern Ireland, Lancashire and the Humber at Pyewipe near Grimsby. The process of catching this species and ringing them with a combination of coloured plastic rings is helping us understand the species migration strategies so we can conserve their feeding, breeding and wintering areas.

Also seen today were 2 stunning Arctic Skuas heading north along the estuary. This seabird is occasionally recorded on the Humber, usually after north or easterly gales and was a very welcome sighting indeed.

The final visit of the month was on the 28th with all the notable sightings occurring at East Halton Skitter and included 18 Common and 2 Arctic Tern observed on the Humber, 6 Avocet and another juvenile Hobby.

The month started with a few nice sightings at East Halton on the 5th, with a single juvenile Arctic Tern heading up river at East Halton Skitter followed by 2 Rock Pipits and an immature Yellow-legged Gull along the shore here. A lovely sight nearby, was 6 Stonechat along one fence line on the mitigation site, this species is a passage migrant to my patch, but to see 6 together was pretty special.

I was back again to East Halton on the 6th in horrible conditions, so I decided to watch the river from the shelter of my car in the hope some seabirds may come up the river in the rough conditions at sea. This was a pretty good decision with me seeing 2 juvenile Gannet, Red-throated Diver, 7 Scaup, 48 Common Scoter, Guillemot and 9 Arctic Tern. All these species had been blown up the estuary in poor conditions at sea and as often happens, they are simply trying to re-orientate themselves back out to sea.

Some species actually pass over land and end up on inland waters or the west coast of the country.

On the 13th, another visit to East Halton Skitter in rainy and rough conditions at sea saw a repeat of the visit on the 6th, albeit in lesser numbers, with a single Guillemot and 3 Goosander being seen and the wonderful sight of 2500 Pink-footed Geese and 22 Whooper Swan passing by. The latter 2 species are winter visitors to the estuary from their summer breeding grounds.

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




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Update from National Grid River Humber Gas Pipeline Replacement Project

Finalising the tunnel

We're very pleased with how our project is progressing – construction of the tunnel between Goxhill and Paull is complete and we're currently in the process of preparing the tunnel for flooding. The water will help facilitate pushing the gas pipeline through the tunnel in the spring of next year. The tunnel preparation works ahead of flooding include; TBM strip out, cleaning the tunnel and installing the cathodic corrosion protection system.

One of our recent challenges was the


Mary on the move from Paul in October 2019 removal of the front section of the tunnel boring machine (TBM), following the completion of tunnelling. Mary, our TBM weighs 510 tonnes and is 160 meters long and her only way out of the tunnel was via Paull

shaft which is 15 metres in diameter. We're pleased to say that Mary was successfully lifted from the tunnel and

transported from our Paull site to Hull docks on four separate specially selected trailers - two movements on Wednesday 9th and two on Thursday 10th

You may have seen a much newer looking Mary come through Goxhill on the way to construct the tunnel in December 2017!

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

The Goxhill "Watch Office" Is Coming to Life ...

Our Control Tower from Goxhill, England is opening to the public. After two years of interior work, restoration, the retro-fitting of appropriate temperature and humidity controls, and the addition of

extensive original period equipment and furnishings, the museum is starting to experiment with the "soft opening" of this historic building to learn how to create the most powerful Guest Experience possible.

Many of our guests are largely unaware of the historical significance of the Goxhill airbase, and future exhibits will focus on this. Just months after Pearl Harbor, men and machines were beginning to flood into England as part of the "Friendly Invasion", and the Royal Air Force base

Every airfield had a sophisticated site plan that accommodated living, training, and working buildings for up to 2,500 people. We have the actual Air Ministry plan for Goxhill and many wartime photographs that will help guests understand the scale and scope of the Goxhill base.

at Goxhill, England was the very first of hundreds of such bases turned over to or built for the United States Army Air Forces. Moreover, Goxhill is the first independent home in England of what was to become "The Mighty Eighth". Goxhill was an initial and crucial part of the beginning of the long road to Victory in Europe. Getting to this stage has involved thousands of

volunteer hours in research, fabrication, and exhibit planning. While there is still much to be done, the initial results have garnered high praise from museum professionals and guests alike.

Our guests will be able to reflect on the use of RAF / USAAF Goxhill by both services and countries as well as learn, much more than

in typical museums, about what life was like on an airbase and on the "Home Front" in England. There are literally hundreds of period pieces now on exhibit with the hope that

the way that the rooms are arranged will help guests feel like they are in a working World War II control tower, not a museum.

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Goxhill Methodist Church Dedications Book

I will long look back fondly on the 1st September service at Goxhill Chapel at which we launched our book of dedications for the windows replaced a year earlier.

My overwhelming feeling was of tremendous relief because unbeknown to Rev'd Nichola as she put the service



together, the copies of the paperback were only delivered on the preceding Friday! As that last working day approached and I feared some terrible last-minute calamity.

I made frantic contingency plans for who I could ask to travel to the printers in Peterborough and claim the boxes of books and how I was going to manage to take possession of them. We took it close to the wire because we wanted the book to be as good as it could be as our tribute to the people remembered in the panes of glass that have so enhanced

our worship space.

We are hugely proud of the book and the effort that went into it. Eileen Mosey compiled the 46 pieces that make up the book, chasing and encouraging, typing-up and

processing; I then spent months editing and laying out both the hardback that lives in Chapel and the paperback version we made available to buy on 1st September. It was a labour of love but I can't deny I am pleased it's over.

There were so many people important to Goxhill Chapel who did not feature

in windows and therefore the books. So many names and stories lost to time. One such was Frank Foulston. As my mum's great uncle he was named in the dedication to one of my family's panes, but not identified in any window as he and his wife Nellie never had children. Frank died in 1973 leaving a significant bequest to Goxhill Chapel that lay untouched for 46 years. This summer we decided to honour Frank's memory by using his legacy to buy copies of the

new Methodist hymn book, Singing the Faith, which contains a fantastic mix of traditional favourites and modern worship songs. My mum's cousin, Heather, visiting for the dedication service, was so delighted when she opened the brand new hymn book and was surprised to see the dedication to her Uncle Frank, whose farm she visited frequently during childhood, that she started taking photos and sending them to her sisters before Rev'd Nichola had even delivered the sermon. They are all thrilled that Frank's memory will live on as we worship in song, and one

of them has been so inspired that her parents – Norman and Connie – are now to be remembered in Singing the Faiths purchased for the Beverley church where they worshipped in the final years of their lives.

Despite the great service and pleasing sales, we do have copies of the paperback left. If vou know someone with a connection to Goxhill Chapel past or present, or to anyone remembered in the text, they are

highly recommended as Christmas gifts.

DIDN'T WE "ALL" DO WELL

This year after a long break we entered the **CPRE Best Kept Village Competition**, although we didn't have an enormous amount of time to put the word out, or make any detailed form of preparations, when everyone eventually got together the effort was fantastic. Residents put out planters, mowed grass frontages their own and beyond. Contractors gave their time free, to mow areas that were not usually covered, and we all worked together to do whatever was necessary. Stiff brushes and shovels came out and all the neglected areas were swept within an inch of lives (so to speak). we left the surface on, just. It didn't matter which way the judges came into the village they were greeted with a very beautiful sight. The result - a "Commendation". The Cemetery went one better, the beautifully maintained burial area together with the open field at the rear, won the Best Cemetery Award, fantastic. It was an absolute honour to go to the presentation evening to receive the awards on behalf of the village, the result of everyone's hard work.

Only one problem, we have set a standard, and now have a reputation to live up to. We now have 12 months to see what more we can achieve together.

Flood Risk and Drainage Consultation Also recently an open meeting was held by North Lincolnshire Council Drainage section at the Memorial Hall, to explain and show the work that had been done over the last four years to identify any flood risk areas. Maps had been produced outlining ditches, dykes low lying areas, and drains, the details were all from existing maps but collated from the oldest to the recent produced ones following their investigations. It was an excellent presentation and showed what is needed both by their engineers and possibly our selves, as landowners, and property owners. We are aware that the village does have low areas and we have many open ditches, all serve an important purpose, and all need to remain clear. It may be that the serious risk is once in 5 or 10 years but if they are neglected or used as a tipping facility, which sadly some are, then the whole circuit comes to a halt, and we have problems. Let's ensure that we all do our bit, and if we have ditches, or dykes, on our land we ensure that they are maintained in a proper manner, for the benefit of the whole area.

Cemetery All tidy and in good order, some work is still needed on the border in the back field planting etc, this could be carried out during the winter. Three seats have

been kindly donated by Wootton Lifestyle, a group of very generous hard working young people. These will be located on the mown footpath around the perimeter of the rear field, a good place to sit and remember loved ones.

Library. Still being run very efficiently by our volunteers, however, they are getting fewer and it would be very much appreciated if anyone who has the time and the inclination, could consider joining them. It is 0pen three afternoons a week in pleasant surroundings and good company.

Playing field. The footpaths have now been completed and are clean tidy and safe. The new trees planted in the second field are mostly doing well, however the stakes were stolen, pulled out very roughly, which allowed the trees to rock in the strong winds, this caused one costly semi-mature tree to die. Why are some people so mean as to steal stakes. The Skate Park is once more before planning and fingers crossed we may be successful. Seats are to be placed on the field, between the MUGA and the Play ground, these have been kindly, and generously donated by the very hard working young people from Goxhill Heroes. Many thanks to them.

Allotments. A successful year despite the changeable weather, but that is the challenge of gardening. Anyone interested in acquiring a plot should apply to the Parish Council, to be placed on the waiting list, this is an ideal time to apply, plenty of time before Spring.

Millennium Green. Looking brilliant, sadly there has been some vandalism, a seat was thrown into the trees and smashed. This was rescued and neatly repaired by a contractor (you can hardly see the join). Some work needs to be done in the woodland at the rear, self setting trees need to be removed from between the planted ones to prevent overcrowding.

I would mention one important item, in recent months I have found small plastic canisters left on the ground on the playing field and on the Millennium Green, by users. These have been cleared and I will continue to clear them when and if they appear again, but if anyone finds them dispose of them properly, with care, and inform the police.

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GOXHILL'S COMMUNITY LIBRARY

Ever kept a library book beyond its return date? It's easily done so I guess most library users find themselves in that situation every now and then. But consider arguably the 'most overdue' library book ever borrowed from (and subsequently returned to) a UK library: The Adventures of Pinocchio by Carlo Collodi. This book was loaned out by Rugby Library in Warwickshire during the 1950s and only found its way back to the library 63 years later during an eight-day "fines amnesty" that shielded the guilty patron from what would have been a £4,000 penalty. As Goxhill Community Library does not apply fines there should be no need for anyone to wait for an amnesty to return an overdue book.

Our Community Library is situated in the Parish Rooms on Howe Lane, run by volunteers and entirely free for you to use, including a wi-fi broadband connection.

Joining online via the North Lincolnshire Council website takes about 5 or 10 minutes. As well as giving you a library card to borrow books, it enables you to search for books online and reserve them to be sent over to you at Goxhill library. If you are unsure about using the internet or would like any help with joining then simply call in and the volunteer on duty will help you.

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
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MORE FAMILIES FROM WORLD WAR 1 REMEMBERED

At this time of year, with Remembrance Day on 11th November, the imagery of war and the associated heightened emotions of significant anniversaries, for example this year the 75th anniversary of D-Day and the Battle of Normandy, brings to the fore the Commonwealth War Graves Commission (CWGC). The regular, immaculately tended lines of Portland stone headstones in vast foreign cemeteries, continue to draw those few left behind, who seek to honour the men and women with whom they fought, alongside often multiple generations of a family determined to honour a relative who was lost. The CWGC honour the 1.7 million men and women of the Commonwealth forces who died in the First and Second World Wars. Sir Fabian Ware sought to find a way to ensure that the final resting places of the dead would not be lost forever. By 1915 the work he led was recognised by the War Office and named the Graves Registration Commission. In May 1917 the Imperial War Graves Commission was established. Land for cemeteries and memorials was identified for the around 587,000 graves and some 559,000 casualties who had no known grave. The work continues today. In October the remains of thirteen First World War soldiers discovered at Hill 80 were buried at the Wytschaete Military Cemetery near Ypres; two unknown soldiers of the Royal Fusiliers buried at New Irish Farm Cemetery, Belgium and a burial service for an unknown soldiers at Vieille-Chapelle New Military Cemetery near Calais.

Those who served and are commemorated by the CWGC abroad are often remembered on family headstones in many village churchyards (as with David Martinson (Gander Winter 2018)) and cemeteries (as with Wilfred Wardle (Gander Winter 2017)). Also, many serving on home soil who, for some reason, lost their life, as with William Williamson (Gander Summer 2019)) whose grave is in Netley CWGC cemetery near Southampton, are commemorated. This too is the case in Goxhill's churchyard.

Initially I had assumed that the CWGC grave, plot 248, in the new church ground, for Arthur John Porter, was because he belonged to the family named Porter that I knew lived in Goxhill around this time. However a search of military records, using his service number, quickly identified that this wasn't the case. Arthur had been born in Swindon in Wiltshire, one of nine surviving children of Henry and Emily Porter and the youngest of their four sons. Henry and Emily were Londoners who had moved down to Swindon sometime between the birth of a daughter in London in 1898 and Arthur's birth in 1899. They had two more children there before being shown on the 1911 census having returned to London and living in Battersea. They were later recorded at 99 Akerman Road in Brixton.

In the 'National Roll of the Great War' Arthur is recorded. His citation states:

'Although under age for military service, he volunteered in September 1915 and at the conclusion of his training was engaged on important duties with his Battery. He did valuable work at various stations in connection with anti-aircraft guns, but on May 21st, 1918, was unfortunately drowned near Hull. "His memory is cherished with pride"

Arthur was 15 years old when he volunteered, serving as a Gunner in the 26th Anti-aircraft company of the Royal Garrison Artillery. At the time of his death he was stationed at New Holland. I haven't been able to find any information on this but various websites provide information about a two gun installation known as the Sunk Island Battery, built across the river from Stallingborough at the outbreak of World War 1, to defend the approach to the port of Hull and the Royal Navy

fuel depot at Killingholme. This same source states that on 7 June 1915, Hull was bombed by Zeppelin airships (as were other towns along the east coast) and that the Sunk Island Battery opened fire on them.

On 25 May 1918 the Lincolnshire Star reported: 'Drowning Fatality At New Holland. On Wednesday a sad bathing fatality occurred at New Holland. Some soldiers were bathing in the 'Quebec' brickpits, when one of them, a private named Porter of the Manchesters was seized with cramp. A friend went to his assistance, and was himself in difficulties. He managed, however, to go for more assistance, but on his return Porter had disappeared. The body was not recovered for some time.'

Arthur's death certificate records that a Coroner's Inquest on 23rd May recorded that his death on 22nd May was due to 'Misadventure due to death by accidental drowning'. It added that this was caused by him 'getting out of his depth and sinking whilst bathing contrary to Military orders, on 21st May 1918'.

The N. Lincolnshire Note Book column in the Hull Daily Mail seemed to be more sympathetic and commented, 'The danger of bathing in disused brickpits was exemplified this week in the fatality at Quebec Brickyard, Goxhill on Tuesday, when a young soldier lost his life. No more dangerous place for a bathe can be imagined for anyone who cannot swim, for the formation of the pits in steps or shelves makes them into death traps for the unwary, and they should be avoided'.

Arthur was buried in Goxhill churchyard on 25th May 1918 and, sadly, I haven't been able to find any reporting on his funeral. His mother Emily had been widowed the year before and it has been impossible to find out whether his family were able to travel from London in time to be present at his funeral service. However a CWGC working party visited Goxhill



churchyard this summer and has cleaned Arthur Porter's headstone and cleared the area where he is buried making it accessible for those who wish to remember him.

Arthur John PORTER, Gunner 146598, Royal Garrison Artillery. Died 21 May 1918. Aged 19 years. Born 1899 Swindon, Wiltshire. Resident of Brixton, London. Son of late Henry George and Emily Amelia Porter of 99 Akerman Road, Stockwell, London. Buried All Saints Churchyard, Goxhill, Lincolnshire

Herbert Moore's CWGC grave lies in the old church ground in plot 1208. His headstone lies 'recumbent' (lying down) on the plot shared with his wife Frances. Herbert was born on 7th October 1884 in South Killingholme. His parents were James and Hannah. Hannah was, I believe, a widow who already had three children, Joseph, Sarah and John Panton when she married James. Sarah's first husband, William, had been a brick maker in South Killingholme and James, her second husband is listed in the 1891 census, also a brickmaker at Good's brickyard, South Killingholme. James and Hannah had at least six children, their oldest daughter recorded as being born in Goxhill, before three sons were born at Killingholme, then two daughters, born in 1889 and 1890 at Hothfield, near Ashford in Kent. The 1891 census recorded them once more

in South Killingholme but Hannah died in Goxhill, in December 1897, presumably at the home listed in the 1901 census at the East Marsh brickyard.

Herbert is recorded in 1901 aged 16 and a brickyard labourer, living alongside his widowed father James and brothers James and Arthur, at the East Marsh brickyard with their oldest sister Florence acting as housekeeper. I haven't been able to find any records for the two youngest children, Edith and Alice, after the 1891 census. Two other families were recorded living and working there, the Turners and the Handsleys. I believe that what is listed in the 1901 census as the 'East Marsh brickyard' was sited at the bank down the fields behind the bungalow at Low Risby (once a two storey house) and Fir Tree Farm. I've searched through lots of sources of information to try to gather together all the names used for the various (possibly seven in total) brickyards along the Goxhill portion of the Humber Bank, from the New Holland boundary to East Halton Skitter (Skitter Haven) and believe that this pit has also been known variously, over time, as Thacker's brickyard and Thompson's brickyard houses. I would appreciate any corrections or further knowledge concerning this.

After 1901 I haven't been able to find any record for Herbert. In 1911 his father James is listed as widowed, a labourer and boarding in East Halton; brother James is a brickyard labourer and boarding with Frederick Hudson and his family. Frederick was the Foreman at, I believe, Dawson City brickyard (houses referred to by Dennis Percy as Birkett's cottages); and brother Arthur, a labourer living at North Kelsey.

In the same section as the Moores, in the 1901 census, after the two families of Alfred and Samuel Dent and before the 'Brickyard Marsh' households (later, I believe, known as Klondike), the Plumtree family is recorded. The enumerator, in his initial overview of the area of the village, at the start of the census, provides a very detailed overview and specifically lists two Dent families, then the Plumtree, Wright and Cressey households at Goxhill Haven. Farmer Thomas, his wife Martha and their three children are recorded. Their13 year old daughter, Frances Bernice was born in Goxhill on 28 July 1888 and was baptised in the village one month later. At the 1911 census the Plumtrees are recorded farming and living in North End. Frances Plumtree married Herbert Moore in 1912 in Goxhill.

I wonder if, as youngsters, Herbert and Frances had joined in the services held for the brickyard and farming communities at the Methodist Chapel, which stood in Goxhill Marsh in the area known as Klondike? The 1901 census overview of this area appears to refer to the brickyard houses here as 'Edgecombe's brickyard houses' but the scanned script is a



The derelict remains of a farm that also stood there remain today but the Chapel and a cottage named 'Applepie' have long since been demolished. The only child of Herbert and Frances, a daughter Vera, was born the year after their marriage, in 1913. At some point, Herbert enlisted for the Royal Naval Reserve and served as





a Deckhand. As with, it is estimated about one third of all who fought, Herbert died not in conflict but of disease. He died at the Newhaven Sick Quarters, East Sussex on 9 November 1918, just two days before the Armistice, of pneumonia and influenza. His wife's address is recorded as Church Street, Goxhill.

The Lincolnshire Star dated 16th November 1918 reported Herbert's funeral: 'GOXHILL NAVAL FUNERAL. On Monday afternoon the remains of Mr Herbert Moore were interred in the churchyard with full naval honours. Deceased, who was 34 years of age, died at Newhaven on Saturday morning from pneumonia. Before joining up he was a workman at Immingham. He leaves a widow and one daughter. The Rev. S. A. Andrew officiated. The mourners were Mrs Moore widow; Miss Vera Moore daughter; Mr Moore father; Mr and Mrs Plumtree father and mother-in-law; Mr E and Miss M E Plumtree brother and sister-in-law; Mr and Mrs Stark, Mrs Costello, Miss F and I Fellowes cousins, of Grimsby; Mr and Mrs W Dent uncle and aunt; Miss E and F Dent cousins; Mr and Mrs Kirby New Holland; Mrs and Miss Allenby Hull: Mrs Burton New Holland and numerous friends from Goxhill. There were several floral tributes'. Similarly the CWGC working party had cleaned Herbert Moore's headstone and cleared the grave he shares with his wife.

Frances and Vera continued to live in Church Street, after Herbert's death. At the 1939 census they are recorded living at the Church end of the street directly after Tom Towle Farrow, who was the bootmaker and father of Percy Latham Farrow (Gander Autumn 2019), and who lived at Laburnum Cottage; I'm assuming Frances and Vera lived at Heydon House? Frances worked as a Stewardess on the LNER Humber Ferry service. Laburnum Cottage is recorded as her residence at her death in 1945. Vera had married in 1939. Her husband was Frank Wardle and they lived in Goxhill, ultimately at the New Hall on Howe Lane, before moving to live in Barrow in later life. Frank's younger brother Wilf, was killed in World War 2 (Gander Winter 2017) and is remembered on his parent's headstone in Goxhill cemetery and is buried in the CWGC in Lille, France. Herbert Moore and Wilf Wardle are both commemorated on memorials in All Saints Church and at Goxhill Memorial Hall.

Herbert MOORE, Deckhand 16789, Royal Naval Reserve. Died 9 November 1918 Aged 33 years. Born 7 October 1884 South Killingholme. Resident of Goxhill. Husband of Frances Bernice Moore of Church Street, Goxhill. Buried All Saints Churchyard, Goxhill, Lincolnshire.

footpath 62 which is the one-off Chapel Street through to Vicars Bridge. A group of Goxhill residents including myself are hoping to gain support for a Community Wildflower Area with wildlife habitat and educational material in this location. Another location for some wildflowers was put forward by a member of the Parish Council, but the suggested area does not allow for the community to develop the project and be involved in the development of their own village.

Assuming we will be applying to take part in the "Best **Kept Village"** competition next year, we believe this type of community project would be very impressive as it fulfils guidelines relating to DEFRAS "biodiversity 2020" which puts people at the heart of the policy working with them to engage more people and empower them to make a difference. Lincolnshire Wildlife Trust Protecting Wildlife for the Future is also anxious that projects are undertaken to protect hedgehogs, other small mammals, amphibians, reptiles and ground nesting birds and offer sound advice.

We will certainly be pushing for approval of our proposal. This proposal is about contributing to the aesthetic of the village, getting back to community participation for both old and new residents of Goxhill and much, much more.

We need your support to make this a success.

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We would like to ask all women to take up their opportunity and attend their cervical screening test at their GP's surgery as a matter of importance for their own health and their opportunity to have children in future.

If the time or date is not convenient or you missed your last test, ring your GP's surgery and arrange another one which could be after hours. Most women aged 25-64, who require a test, receive an invitation letter every 3 or 5 years depending upon their age, younger women are invited more frequently. If you are unsure, please ring and talk to a member of staff at your GP's surgery.

The rate of take up of cervical screening is currently at a 21 year low. The actual test only takes a few minutes, is free and results are available in about 2 weeks.

The symptoms of cervical cancer are not always obvious and so if you miss your smear test you might not realise until the cancer has reached an advanced stage. As a result and you might need a major operation, be unable to have children or indeed it may lead to your early death. That is why it is important for you to attend regular cervical screenings. Also please encourage others to also attend their own appointments.

Cervical screening can stop this cancer before it starts.

As your Ward members for Goxhill we would like to take this opportunity to update you on the Goxhill Surface Water Flood Alleviation scheme. On 25th September, we attended a public drop in LINCOLNSHIRE event at the Memorial Hall, together with officers from North Lincolnshire Councils Flood Risk and Drainage Team. We have been working for some time on an over-arching study to tackle surface

water for the whole settlement of Goxhill. We reached a point where it was important to consult with residents on what we have achieved so far, where we want to get too, and most importantly get your views and local knowledge to assist finalising our study work. At the session a number drawings of Goxhill, overlayed with some of our modelling work and explained the approach we have taken to better protect the residents of Goxhill as a whole. With many residents attending it was important that we gave you all an assurance that we are working hard and there is progress towards a suitable and deliverable solution. We have asked that the Flood Risk and Drainage Team to continue to update us as different milestones are hit within the overall scheme. We intend to host a further consultation session with residents once we have completed more detailed design.
